draft MINUTES

Regular Meeting July 11, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m. in Conference Room 5, located in the City of Ukiah Civic Center Annex, 411 West Clay, Ukiah, CA by Chair Janet Pauli.

Public Expression

Chair Pauli explained that anything not currently on the agenda may be discussed at this time, however no action could be taken. She further advised that comments would be welcome throughout the meeting.

Minutes

On a motion by Commissioner Carre Brown, seconded by Talso, the minutes of the meetings of June 13 & 25 were unanimously approved.

- b. <u>Eel/Russian River Commission meeting update</u>—Commissioner Carre Brown reported that the next meeting will be held in the Mendocino County BOS chambers in August.

- h. <u>City of Ukiah purple pipe recycled water program</u>—White reported that they are still holding out on delivering the water until they receive an approval letter from the Dept. of Drinking Water stating that the department has approved the last report submitted by the City.
- i. <u>Discussion of SB88 (measurement requirements for water diverters)</u>—The Commissioners agreed to take this item off the next agenda.

Potter Valley Project

a. Status report and discussion of the FERC Orphan Project process for the PVP—David Aladjem joined the group by phone. Commissioner Carre Brown reported that she, Pauli, and Elliot had a meeting in Covelo with the Round Valley Tribe regarding the PVP. The Tribe Council also had their attorneys in the room. They gave an overview of the resolution the Council passed in 2009 expressing concerns regarding the fisheries, about the water going through their land, the reduction of available fish and Scott Dam. They also handed out a paper titled the Necessity of a Free Flowing River. Brown relayed to the tribal members that the diversion to the Russian River had been cut by 50% in 2005, which they didn't seem to be aware of. She also talked about all of the political boundaries and that both the Eel and Russian Rivers flow through Mendocino County. The fact that various political and environmental groups are part of this NOI group partnership will allow for Federal funding.

Pauli reported that Curtis Berkey, a tribal attorney, expressed that they are concerned about Eel River restoration and are very vested in the science and facts surrounding issues with the Eel. He relayed that they need to be realistic about the costs of their objectives and that one of their chief biologists, Scott McBain is working on an ecological evaluation of the Eel River restoration. The Wiyot tribe is extremely concerned about the impacts of the PVP on the Eel River.

Jim Russ, President of the Round Valley Tribal Council, told them that the Council will be voting on whether they would want to join the NOI Partners group and sign the Planning Agreement (PA). They would expect to be at the July 26th meeting if they voted favorably.

Brown also mentioned that they talked about Federal water rights and the issue of sediment contamination in the lake. Pauli made it clear that the contamination is believed to be in the mud and not in the lake water. There was discussion about PG&E and whether they would still be required to provide studies for the PVP relicensing.

David Aladjem stated that there appeared to be some Tribal Council discomfort to move forward with the PA and yet the President seemed to be pushing the members to move forward. There was a legal question about a Federal Water Reserve Right. When the Federal government created reservations for tribes, Congress implied that there would be sufficient water to meet the needs of the reservation. The nature of the right and how much it would be was not defined. The Tribes might argue that the flow needs to be enough to allow a healthy run for the anadromous fish, though the attorney stated they didn't really want to go there. If they waive their water reserve rights, the Federal government might pay them a settlement for the waiver.

Brown reported that they are hoping that Senator McGuire would carry legislation to form some type of authority that would allow for a property assessment to help pay for the maintenance and operations of the PVP. The County's letter of support for the NOI is on the BOS agenda for next Tuesday.

Pauli reported that the Water Supply subcommittee of Huffman's Ad Hoc are wrapping up their reports. Pauli recently spoke to the American Council of Engineering Companies ,Windsor group about the PVP.
